## Hi Eoin,

The current position is that all asylum seekers can work legally if they have been 9 months awaiting the decision on their application for international protection and get a permission to access the labour market. The access to labour market was introduced on an interim basis from Feb 18 and on the current wider basis since July 2018. This includes both those living in the community and those in accommodation centres (direct provision). There is no requirement on asylum seekers to accept accommodation in the centres although most do.

If the general position is that people who have lost their employment receive the COVID-19 payment then I would think that this also applies to asylum seekers working legally.

The issue that I see is that they may not qualify for another DEASP payment. This cohort doesn't meet HRC and therefore wouldn't qualify for JSA or Basic SWA. They may qualify for JB if they have sufficient contributions.

(Separately DEASP pays the daily expenses allowance **only** to asylum seekers living in the accommodation centres (direct provision))
